## About tonight...

Tonight's reconciliation ceremony is gently inspired by aspects of Jewish tradition.

First, our reading from Exodus 34 contains two verses (6-7) known as the "Thirteen Attributes" of God which are part of Jewish penitential prayers.

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According to the Jewish storytelling traditions, after the Golden Calf incident Moses felt that Israel's sin was so serious that there was no possibility of intercession on their behalf. At this point, God appeared to Moses and taught him the Thirteen Attributes, thus offering reassurance that repentance is always possible and that God always awaits our return..

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Secondly, we draw inspiration from the Jewish *Tashlich* ritual. Since the Middle Ages, some Jews have practised the custom of visiting a river or other body of water after their synagogue service on *Rosh Hashanah* (Jewish new year). There they repeat the following sentence three times while casting bread crumbs into the water. "You will cast all our sins into the depths of the sea."

This sentence comes from the Book of Micah: "Who is a God like you, pardoning inquity...


Who does not retain your anger forever, because you delight in showing mercy....
You will cast all our sins into the depths of the sea." (Micah 7:18-20)

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Tonight, as we celebrate the Sacrament of Reconciliation, we remember that Jesus grew up learning about God's mercy as a faithful Jew who pondered the Hebrew Scriptures.

## **Individual Confession and Absolution**

Please approach via the centre aisle.

If you are making your First Reconciliation, mention this to the priest. If you are not a Catholic, tell the priest and he will give you a blessing.

After your confession, move to the area in front of the altar.

Pick up a stone. Hold it in your hand. Let it be a symbol of your sin which has been confessed and forgiven. When you are ready, drop the stone into the water, praying quietly this line from Scripture:
"You cast our sins into the depths of the sea"

#### Penance:

Spend some quiet time after confession re-reading the Scripture passage from Exodus 34 (inside this leaflet), reflecting on how this Word speaks to your life
