In a nutshell

The Christian feast of Pentecost has its origins in a Jewish feast that celebrated the first fruits of the harvest and the gift of the law at Sinai. With the outpouring of the Spirit in the wake of Jesus' resurrection, the early Christians celebrated Pentecost as a feast of the 'new law' of Christ's love and the gathering of all peoples in Christ.

A priest says:

Over the last few years I have had the opportunity to celebrate home Masses with Australian families who came to this country as migrants or refugees, some recent arrivals, others of long-standing. They had come from so many different lands and such a variety of cultures: China, Uruguay, Tonga, Italy, Fiji, the Philippines, South Africa, India.

The ambiance was so varied from one house to another; without exception the devotion was warm and social; and the extension of the Eucharist—morning or afternoon tea, lunch or dinner—was both different and delicious.

Gift of song, gift of life

Catherine fell into the habit of singing as she went about her household chores each day. She had a good voice, which she delighted in, and an extensive repertoire to match.

Next door there lived a woman who spent her days at home caring for her housebound father. She told Catherine that her father always wanted his bedroom window open so that he could hear the beautiful singing coming from next door. It was like being at a special concert every day, he said.
