In a nutshell

Some Pharisees in today's Gospel are criticised because they are more concerned for their appearance in the eyes of the public than their standing before God. This Gospel calls us to face up to our own egotistical tendencies, to be humble and to discover our true identity as children of God, equal to one another in the eyes of our Maker.



What really matters?

The national sales manager of an international firm had to travel throughout the Australian continent during the year. To get the top position he had proved himself to be a super-salesman. Calling on his firm's sales representatives and agents took up most of his time. His wife and children saw little of him. Then, sadly, one day his wife became seriously ill. Her husband quickly understood that it would be impossible for him to spend most of his time travelling away from home. He needed to be around to care for his wife and to be present to his children.

Without delay he resigned from his firm. He needed work that would not take him far afield. So he approached a man running a much smaller company trading in the same products he had been selling before.

He was taken on and now represents this smaller company in the city where he lives. Having forgotten none of his sales skills he is now rapidly expanding his

business and at the same time is able to return home to his wife and children each day after work. (PK)
