No stopping us now

Our 19 year old daughter had mentioned a few times that she would like to go to Africa to work as a missionary. At first I thought it was just a whim for the sake of doing something different. But then my husband and I realised she was genuine. In time her dreams started to take shape and she was accepted for an overseas placement with a Catholic agency. We wanted to encourage and nurture her as she prepared for this undertaking. We began to share our experience of what it meant to put God first in our lives. We explained to her that there would be moments of darkness, but also tremendous joys.

One evening she came home and I could see she had been crying. I asked her if she wanted to share what was troubling her. She immediately expressed what was in her heart: 'Now I know what it is to leave everything like it says in the gospel. It really means everything doesn't it, Mum? My stereo, my CDs and tapes and not having the car when I need it. It means leaving

you, Dad, the rest of the kids.' Her understanding of this touched me...

A few nights later she came into our bedroom and sat on the end of the bed, asking questions about going away. At first the questions were quite superficial, but after a while she said, 'Dad, could it happen that I might be killed or die in Africa?' I said nothing. The question was not directed to me and I also felt my husband would do better than me at a question like that. He said, 'Yes, you could, but we can't let that stop us, otherwise we would never do anything for God.' This answer may have come as a shock to her but she seemed happy and went off to bed.

The day came for her to leave. There were, of course, a few tears, but all had been said on both sides during the previous weeks and months. All detachments to one another and to things had been made. It was up to God to take care of her from now on. (M.D.)
