Sign of the Cross

Jesus Prayer (repeated quietly as a mantra)

Lord Jesus Christ, Son of the Living God, have mercy of me, a sinner.

Prayer to the Holy Spirit (Pentecost)

Come, Holy Spirit, fill the hearts of your faithful. R: And kindle in them the fire of your love. Send forth your Spirit and they shall be created. R: And you will renew the face of the earth.

Peace Prayer of St Francis

Lord, make me an instrument of your peace:

Where there is hatred, let me sow love.

Where there is resentment, pardon. Where there is discord, unity.

Where there is doubt, faith. Where there is despair, happiness.

Where there is sadness, joy. Where there is darkness, light.

Master, grant that I may seek:

To console rather than to be consoled.

To understand rather than to be understood.

To love rather than to be loved.

For it is in giving that we receive.

In forgiving that we are forgiven.

In dying that we rise to eternal life.
